Series of 1922 (Fourth Bureau) were the first stamps to have the date and city of issue announced by the POD in advance. This allowed first day cover servicers to plan their covers and led to the first commercially produced cachet by George W. Linn of Columbus, Ohio. Mr. Linn personally serviced his first cachets for the Harding Memorial stamp at the Harry New, and a previously Marion post office and then obtained unofficial first day cancellations, without cachets, in multiple towns on his way home to Columbus. William Windhurst procured unofficial cancellations from several cities north of Marion.

First day postmarks and cancellations of the two flat plate issues and the rotary issue are shown. First day covers of the rotary perf. 11 issue and the Schermack

The Harding stamp type III perforations do not exist. Twenty seven unofficial first day cancellations for flat plate perf. 11 and flat plate imperf. are shown. There are no known unofficial cancellations of rotary perf. 10. Only one predate 2. cancellation (August 31, 1923, Washington, DC) of flat plate perf. 11 is known to exist.

> Domestic and foreign first day and subse- 4. quent usage of "Black Harding", including postal rates, are demonstrated. From 7/18/19 to 6/29/24 mail was carried by airplane on space available basis at first class National air mail rate. 6. routes were not established until the next year.

> The scarcest first day covers are the first com-7. mercial cachets on three envelope and sizes four mourning border widths by George Linn and mourning 8. covers of the eleven U.S. Departments. Five of the former and eight of the latter are shown.

As mentioned previously, the Series of 1922 and the Harding Memorial Issue ushered in the era of first day covers and cachets. The pioneer servicers of first day covers were in their prime during the period of the Fourth Bureau. Most of them serviced covers for the Two Cent Harding issues, and a number of them are shown in this exhibit.

The Harding Memorial issue was discontinued at the end of February, 1924. but it was the predecessor of eleven more Harding issues over the following eight years.
